Those now in charge have provided a better outlook for the club's league position. The Ammers are out of the bottom three relegation positions, currently in 20th on four points, three clear of the drop.

That's level with Dronfield in 29th.

A 4-3 victory against Harrogate Railway only on Tuesday portrays an improvement in today's visitors' form. Their other point coming against Beverley Town, also at home.

Yorkshire Amateur AFC was founded in November 1918 by Kolin Robertson, but only began playing matches in 1919. In those early days, the club's fixtures largely consisted of playing friendlies at Elland Road following the demise of Leeds City FC, on the order of the Football Association, after irregularities were discovered in their accounts.

However, in 1920, the club decided that the ground was not suitable for their needs and sold the lease to the newly formed Leeds united AFC for the sum of £250.

The aime of the Ammers in those days was to compete as a major force against the professional teams in the North of England. This proved not to be viable and in 1920 the club became of the founder members of the Yorkshire League. In 1922, the club became the first British team to tour in Latvia and Estonia. The club produced a number of leading amateur international players such as Joe Woodcock who, at left-back, was the first Bradford born amateur international.

The 'Ammers', as they were known, moved to their present headquarters at Bracken Edge in 1922 afrer using several other gorunds, including sharing with Harrogate Town. This period was by far their most successful for the club and a record crowd of 3569 paid receipts of £160 to see the 5-2 Amateur Cup Quarter Final replay over Wimbledon. This was after a 2-2 draw at Wimbledon before a crowd of 12,000. The Ammers had demolished the holders, Wycombe

Wanderers, 4-0 in the previous round and the club's sights were now set on a Wembley appearance. Unfortunately, Marine FC had not read the script and triumphed 2-1 in the semi-final relay played at Leicester City's ground.

Such was the strength of the side in the 1931-32 season that George Hudson, the Amateur international and Captain of that season's Football Association Representative XI, could not make the Ammers side and left the club in midseason to join Farsley Celtic in the hope of gaining a first team place. The same season saw the club finish as runners-up to Huddersfield Town in the Yorkshire League after losing 2-1 in a play-off. The club also reached the first round of the FA Cup, losng 3-1 at home to Carlisle United after defeating Denaby United, Altrincham and Frickley on the way.

The 2007-08 period saw John Ward taking over the academy and bringing a whole host of exciting young players with him to add to the players already at the Academy. Several Yorkshire Amateur Junior players also made the step up to the Academy. The Academy had a very good season, finishing third place in the league and having a good run in the FA Youth Cup.

The 09-10 season saw further changes made with the reserves entering the Lancashire League which will be a better standard of football than the league they were previously in, which will hopefully better prepare players for the demands of the NCEL.

In 2007, the clubhouse was redecorated as well as the addition of a separate changing room for female officials and a new dance floor was installed.

Ammers were forcibly relegated from the NPL East at the end of the 21/22 season due to ground grading issues, despite a 10th placed finish.

Subsequently, the club was taken over in the summer of 2022, bringing an end to Nathan Cartman's reign as manager. An entirely new playing squad was assembled, consisting mainly of academy players, within three weeks of the start of the 22/23 season.

Yorkshire Amateur appointed their current manager Casey O'Reilly towards the end of the 22/23 season with an, albeit too late, upturn in form before Ammers' relegation. Andy Blair has joined the coaching staff this season as O'Reilly's assistant, working alongside Emeel Mati as first-team coach.

DRONFIELD



Although football has been played in Dronfield since the 1860s, the history of the current Dronfield Town Fc can be traced back to 1973 when Briand Gould was asked to put a side together to take to Sindelfingen (Dronfield's town town in Germany). the following season, Brian entered a team called Dronfield Town in Sheffield Sunday League made up mainly of the lads that went to Sindelfingen, some of whom went on to play for Dronfield town for many years. Sadly, through lack of interest, the team folded at the end of that season.

In 1998, Dronfield sports JFC moved from the Masons Arms to the Pioneer Club and changed its name to Dronfield Town. At that time there were seven under 16s' football teams. the club now boasts eighteen junior boys sides ranging from under 7s to under 18s, playing in three different league, Sheffield & District JFL, Rowsley youth League and the Sheffield & District DB Sports u18 league.

The adult football section reappeared when dads who used to play football together to bring their kids to play for the junior football teams, decided to reform and have an Indian summer playing their skills in the Hope Valley League. Initially they were called Dronfield Cavaliers but when their bodies shouted enough is enogh they added some young blood and changed their name to Dronfield Town in season 00/01.

In 01/02, Les Millington took his successful u18s team into the HOpe Valley League. Success came immediately and between 01-05 the first team had a very successful time. In four season they won all 3 Hope Valley divisions, as well as the Chatsworth Cup, Cliff Ellis trophy, Roden Cup, Lawrence Cup, Dore Shield and also the prestigious Derbyshire Divisional Cup.

The first team has since moved on through the Midlands Regional Alliance to the Central Midlands League and in the 13/14 season were successfully promoted to the NCEL, the highest any Dronfield team has ever reached.

In the summer of 04 the club broadened its community appeal by forming four junior girls teams. Once under 10s, two under 12s and an under 14s. This section of the club has grown steadily overt he years and now has eleven junior girls teams, containing over 150 girls, playing the game in teams from u9s to u18s.

In 09/10, from the then u18s girls team, Dronfield Town Womens was formed and is now competing in the East Midlands Womens Regional League. This team has the distinction of being the first Dronfield Town team to compete in a national copetiton when in the 11/12 season they played in the Women's FA Cup.

The old timers were not to be outdone by the young upstarts. In 03 Dronfield town over 35s took to the field for the first time in the Wragg League and still continues, in addition to two over 45s teams.

The 17/18 season saw the introduction of the u21s, bridging the gap from junior to senior football.
